### **Tuesday, March 25, 7:30 p.m. - Desert Dreams:**

Many picture the desert as a barren and inhospitable place. Jeffrey Hall's presentation, *Desert Dreams, a quest through the American Southwest* will show the richness of this scenic landscape. His slides reveal the ancient homes of the Anasazi, and the present habitat of a surprising variety of plant and animal life.

Big Bend, Monument Valley, Canyon de Chelly, the Huachuca Mountains and the Salton Sea are home to roadrunners and cactus, but also host surprises like nesting shorebirds and gulls. The talk will be held at the **Laurel Avenue School** (corner of Laurel Avenue and Union Street in Kingston, NJ). It's free, and all are welcome.



An avid birder and talented photographer and speaker who teaches biology at the Pennington School in Pennington, NJ, Jeffrey Hall's articles and photographs have appeared in *Living Bird*, *Underwater Naturalist*,

New Jersey Audubon, and many other publications. Currently the program director of Washington Crossing Audubon Society, he served two terms as its president. In addition to presentations to nature and conservation groups, he is an experienced lecturer on these topics with Elderhostel. For more information, call 609-514-2416.

**Saturday, April 12, 2 p.m. - Animal Ambassadors:** Come meet the animal ambassadors from the Mercer County Wildlife Center! The Center is a state and federally licensed facility that cares for injured, ill, and displaced native wildlife. They provide these animals with medical treatment and a temporary refuge before releasing them back into an appropriate wild habitat.



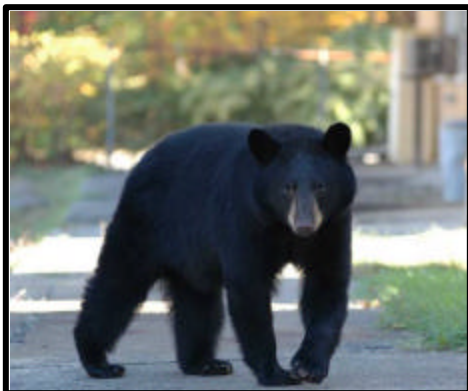
This demonstration, given by Nancy Derrico, will be held at the **D&R Canal State Park Headquarters, 145 Mapleton Road, Kingston**. It will feature four animals that for various reasons are not releasable back into the wild. These animals travel to schools and community events throughout the year, acting as ambassadors for their wild counterparts. **Saturday, April 26, 2-4 p.m. – Friends of Princeton Nursery Lands Arbor Day Celebration:** William Flemer, IV will present a demonstration on the grafting techniques that were used at Princeton Nurseries when they occupied this site. Alumni who worked at the Nursery will be on hand, and a tree donated by Princeton Nurseries will be planted. This event will be held at **Mapleton Preserve/D&R Canal State Park, 145 Mapleton Road, Kingston**. All guests will receive a seedling tree to bring home and plant. Free and open to the public. **Thursday, May 15, 7:30 p.m. -- KGA ANNUAL MEETING: "Know The Bear Facts."** Mark your calendars and come to the **Kingston Fire House on Heathcote Road, Kingston** for our annual meeting and elections.



Following a brief business meeting, Michelle Ruggiero from the NJ Department of Environmental Protection's Division of Fish and Wildlife will present "Know the Bear Facts." Black bears have now been confirmed in all 21 of New Jersey's counties, so this program is designed to help residents to become better educated about this important component of the state's natural heritage.

The talk covers the natural history and biology of bears in the Garden State and the results of past and current black bear research. It also includes practical information on coexisting with black bears, such as steps one should follow in order to ensure that bears do not become a nuisance animal in the neighborhood. Our presenter,

Michelle Ruggiero, is an Assistant Biologist with the NJ Department of Environmental Protection's Division of Fish and Wildlife, where she has worked full-time since 2004, having started her career within the Division of Watershed Management.

## PAST EVENTS

**Audubon Christmas Bird Count...** It was a rough day for the Christmas Bird Count—the weather was raw and windy and it rained till 3 PM. We had four soggy counters—Mark Peel, Anne Zeman, Ed Metcalfe, and Karen Linder—plus two feeder watchers, Gwen Southgate and Edith Neimark, who wisely chose to avoid the nasty weather and count from the comfort of their homes. Due to the poor weather and fewer eyes, the number of birds seen was lower than usual, but we still found 44 species and 1302 birds, including 11 turkeys, a flock of soaking wet bluebirds, 4 great blue herons and 2 kingfishers. Firsts for this year's count were red-winged blackbirds, and near Rockingham, a flock of American pipits in the grass. An exciting non-bird sighting (near the shrine across from St. Joseph's Seminary) was a red fox on a ledge, perched near a dirt mound that could indicate a den.

**October 22, 2007: KGA Fall Foliage Walk...** Over forty people turned out for our leisurely fall foliage walk, which began in the parking lot of the John Flemer Preserve on the southbound side of Route 27, and wound through the woods and up to Rockingham, Washington's Revolutionary War Headquarters in Kingston.

Our walk leaders were George Luck Jr. and Sam deTuro. George Luck, who has lived in Kingston all of his life, is a passionate history buff, and well-known for his historical talks and ghost walks in the Kingston area. Sam deTuro, the arborist who founded Woodwinds (a Kingston-based tree service that celebrated its 40th anniversary this year) shared his knowledge of trees and shrubs we saw along the way. In addition to viewing the fall foliage, we also saw evidence of beaver activity along the D&R Canal!
